### Cultivating the Life of the Mind

At a recent Morning Prayer service, I listened to a meditation entitled The Hidden Life of Jesus. Insightfully, the author, Henri Nouwen, raised an idea I had never really thought about: The largest part of Jesus' life was "hidden." Adding: "Jesus lived a simple, hidden life in a small town, far away from all the great

people, great cities, and great events."

Paradoxically, Jesus' simple, unspectacular, ordinary, and hidden life is an essential quality—in fact, the source—of the spiritual life. In hiddenness, Luke tells us, we can increase in wisdom, in stature, and in favor with God and with people. (2:52)

In the hiddenness of our lives—in solitude, silence, prayer, anonymous acts of love and compassion, friendships, ordinary tasks, and others—we can grow spiritually. Our hearts can be opened to the love of God, our souls can be quieted and

centered in Christ, and we can be transformed into the image of God. The hidden Christ reveals Himself in the quiet, hidden places of our lives.

I would like to add one more place of hiddenness: the life of our minds! Christ engages us in and through our reason, intelligence, imagination, creativity, reflection, study and education.

### Confirmation: Then and Now

Confirmation—it was a rite of puberty—a transition from childhood to early adolescence. It was the gate to being able to receive the bread and wine of the Holy Eucharist. It was a reason for a diocesan bishop to visit each parish church. It was a time thirteen-year-olds, usually at the insistence of parents, studied the Catechism so that a Bishop might lay hands on their head and pray that they might be strengthened by the Holy Spirit. Because Confirmation was a routine or seen as obligatory, many who participated in it felt that they did their duty and never darkened the door of a church again.

Our present prayer book significantly changed our understanding of this sacrament. Today it is: 1) an opportunity to reaffirm the vows and promises which were part of our baptism (Since in our tradition, Baptism is usually a baby event, Confirmation makes sense at a later age. However, no particular age is accepted as normative today); 2) it is an opportunity for those newly worshipping in this church to affirm their commitment to Christ in this Episcopal context; and 3) it is an opportunity for those individuals, confirmed or not, to reaffirm their faith.

I have used the word "opportunity" because that is what Confirmation presents; it is not an obligation. It is a sacrament—the outward sign is the laying on of hands, the inner grace is the strengthening of the Holy Spirit within us. All of us might consider how we might approach this opportunity and participate in it.

# Beloved Community



### Sibley Chapel Art Exhibit Features Ethiopian Art

Sibley Chapel has a new exhibition, *Ethiopian Paintings:* Life and Passion of Jesus, many of which are from St. Christopher's collection.

Ethiopia's incredible heritage of visual art has earned the nation international recognition. A school of Ethiopian iconography formed under the most skilled of the local painters who brought a wonderful Eastern

sensibility to the work. The main rule was to "copy faithfully." Since these artists were copying straight from paintings brought from the Holy Land, they felt that the images might be real pictures of actual people, including the Virgin Mary and Jesus. As a result, they did not want to deviate.

For nearly a thousand years, Ethiopian artists have been giving distinctive form to religious images. Some of the new artists have little formal training and paint only for the commercial market—others have more traditional training.

To spend time contemplating such a painting is to look through a window—a portal to Ethiopia's remarkable past. You are invited to spend some contemplative time with these works.



### Here Comes Stewardship 2016!

The 2016 Stewardship Campaign kicks off on Sunday, September 20. Following both morning services, Stewardship Chair Peter Hughes will present the goals and objectives of the campaign followed by a question and answer session. The meeting will take approximately 20 minutes.

This year's campaign theme is "Gratitude In Giving." Stewardship is our individual responsibility to commit time and resources to maintain and grow our church. We should be giving with gratitude and be thankful for all that our relationship with God provides.


Our annual operating budget is approximately \$660,000, of which a full 75% is funded through Stewardship. In 2015 our stewardship totaled \$501,713, derived from 217 pledging families, of which 47 were new pledge families. For 2016 we have set a stewardship goal of \$510,000. Since the total number of pledge families varies from year to year and we unfortunately lose some members along the way, we are asking you to consider a 6% increase in your pledge for 2016. We will also be reaching out to those of you who have not been pledging recently. To accomplish our mission, we need everyone's

participation. Each pledge is important, appreciated and confidential.

To encourage new stewardship participation, we have received a challenge grant from the Dreyfus Fund. The intent of the grant is to match new pledges up to the level of the grant. In 2015 we received a similar Dreyfus grant which we used to expand the number of pledging families and reach our stewardship goal.

A key to the success of the last stewardship campaign was the inclusion of our youth. We all enjoyed the delight and smiles on the faces of our youth as they kept the congregation informed as to the progress of the campaign. Through our Director for Children, Youth, and Families, Kerén Castro, our youth will create a display to help all of us monitor our progress during the 2016 campaign. The display will be updated on a weekly basis.

Here at St. Christopher's we have three primary categories of monies: capital, designated, and operating funds. Capital monies are associated with building needs and investments. Designated monies support specific activities such Aid to Africa and our music program. Operating monies support our annual operating budget. This budget is what it takes to staff

our church and programs as well as operate our facility. Sources of operating funds include special events like the auction and the Friday Night Grill. However, the vast majority (just a little less than 75 percent) is derived from our annual stewardship campaign.

Our success in 2016 Stewardship will enable us to continue the good works of St. Christopher's. We are recognized as a warm and welcoming congregation always ready to expand our horizons and do more. Fortunately we have a significant pool of talented volunteers with terrific skills and a willingness to donate their time and effort. Stewardship is an essential ingredient that provides the monies needed in concert with our staff. facilities and membership to fulfill our mission. These are challenging times for many of us. We are constantly solicited by many organizations and causes.

As you consider your pledge for 2016, please reflect on the importance of St. Christopher's in your life. We do a great job managing the finances of our Church. Your pledge dollars are spent thoughtfully, efficiently and effectively.

As we launch the 2016 Stewardship Campaign, you will receive a trifold brochure which provides additional details as well as a pledge card. I ask you to review the materials, pray and reflect upon what you can contribute, fill out your pledge card, and return it to the church at your earliest convenience.
