Kairos Moments

All Saints' Day, Nov. 1, commemorates "the communion of saints." That is, "the entire membership of the Christian community (persons of heroic sanctity, whose deeds were recalled with gratitude by later generations)" as well as "the vast body of the faithful who, though no less members of the company of the redeemed, are unknown

in the wider fellowship of the Church. It is a day for particular remembrance of family members and friends." (*Holy Women, Holy Men*, p. 664)

All Saints' Day also reminds us that all the saints—the known and unknown, and the living and the dead—are linked eternally in the Body of Christ. John

Williams, an emeritus professor of Classics at Trinity College, beautifully captures the deep relationship that exists between the living and the dead within the Body of Christ. He wrote the following to Berjouhi Spencer upon the death of her beloved husband, Arthur:

I want to share with you something I wished the church talked more about. In the Eucharist, as you know, we always pray for the dead, and that's important. But there is another factor that often is overlooked. And that is in the Preface to the Sanctus in the Great Thanksgiving: Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who forever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your name. All the company of heaven means all our loved ones who have preceded us. The point is that at every Eucharist the dead are at the celestial banquet at the same moment as we are at the terrestrial banquet. This is a Kairos moment: Eternity and the

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Gratitude in Giving – 2016 Stewardship Report

The stewardship team is pleased to report that five weeks into the campaign the total amount pledged for 2016 is \$307,747.17, which is 60.3 percent of our \$510,000 goal. To date 111 pledge families have responded to the appeal. This includes 4 new pledge families.

Our stewardship mailing list consists of 325 households. To achieve our goal and balance the 2016 operating budget, it is essential that we significantly improve our participation rate. In 2015 our participation rate was 67 percent. All pledges are welcome, no matter the amount. Furthermore, all pledges are confidential.

In my own journey, I feel gratitude in giving to St. Christopher's. Our caring and welcoming church provides a special sense of gratitude for me. Our giving consists of a combination of time, talent and treasure, the 3 Ts. Our individual circumstances and abilities change over time such that the quantity and mix of the 3 Ts can be variable for each of us. St. Christopher's needs and welcomes the time, talent and treasure of all its members. Together we continue to advance the mission of our church.

To monitor our progress toward our pledge goal of \$510,000 our youth have developed a cross made up of 51 squares. Each square

Advent Journey: Understanding Race

During Advent we remember the stillness and the darkness experienced by the people of Israel as they waited for the promised messiah. Advent is a time in which we join their waiting by reflecting on the dark places in our current context and turning toward God's promised light.

Over the last two years our country has experienced a resurgence of racial awareness as a result of the loss of life experienced by the black community. The mass shooting in Charleston, along with the independent deaths of Michael Brown, Tamir Rice, Eric Gardner and Trayvon Martin are leading us to examine race concepts and relationships in a way that has been ignored for some time now. The context feels confusing as we try to figure out how to find a path forward.

The truth is that race and race relations are concepts that are largely unexplored. There is significant scientific and historical information that can lead us to a deeper understanding of race, and help us respond to the issue in a way that promotes healing. Jesus' example showed us how to build diverse, accepting and Beloved Community in all contexts. As followers in that faith tradition it is essential that we know how to do the same, in our own time.

This Advent, St. Christopher's is exploring the questions surrounding race through a program titled *Advent Journey: Understanding Race.* This program will occur on three Mondays in Advent: Dec. 7, 14, and 21 from 4:00–6:00 pm. The format for the program will be video/speaker and then small group discussion. On Sunday, Oct. 18, which was *Royal School of Church Music America* Music Sunday, the three new choristers of the Choir School were admitted to the choir, and all of the choristers were commissioned. This was a day to celebrate the joy and beauty that music brings to our worship and liturgy. The choristers sang one anthem

with the adult choir, and one anthem on their own.

During the 2015–2016 year, all students will be seeking advancement in the RSCM's *Voice*



for Life program. The five second-year students will be working toward their light-blue ribbons and the three first-year students will be working toward their white ribbons. Each chorister must demonstrate level-appropriate proficiency in reading music notation, vocal production, rehearsal technique, breath control, and liturgical fluency.

Personal Planning

The Personal Planning Committee also manages St. Christopher's Cloister Society, which recognizes and celebrates parishioners who have planned gifts to St. Christopher's, unless they choose to remain anonymous. The Cloister Society now includes 44 members from 26 church households. The Personal Planning Committee provides education and referrals to qualified legal, financial and health professionals who can help parishioners develop and keep updated their personal plans for their wellbeing and the management of their assets, financial affairs and legacy. The Committee was established several years ago under the leadership of George Olmsted. Errol James and Pieter Schiller recently became the co-chairs of the committee.

The Committee has organized a number of seminars for members of the parish, most recently two discussions on dealing with health emergencies. A new session was held on Oct. 25 on protecting one's family, assets and legacy from catastrophic illness and long term care needs. A second follow-up session will be held on **Sunday, Nov. 15**, and conducted by Lincoln Financial Group, focusing on insurance options. The forum will take place at 11:30 am in Sibley Chapel. finite are united. From the singing of the Sanctus right through to the communion itself, we and our loved ones are in the closest possible presence with God and with one another. As we receive the sacrament, so our loved ones are also receiving it. At every Eucharist, then, we are in the closest possible contact with our loved ones until such time we are reunited with them in eternity. (See the prayer at the bottom of page 493 of The Book of Common Prayer and the second prayer on page 505.) It is

this profound mystery that I find so powerful, so helpful, and so comforting.

As St. Christopher's mourns the passing of several beloved parishioners, let us bear in mind and in heart, that at each celebration of the Holy Eucharist, we are in the "closest possible contact with all our loved ones," and with God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, as well!

Chatham Food Pantry

When people think of Chatham, they conjure up images of sunshine, beaches, lighthouses, shopping, and of course, sharks. The stark reality is that while all of this is true, there are nonetheless citizens who are in need of additional support. This is true for *any* community in

America, and Chatham is no exception.

As Thanksgiving fast approaches, it is important that we remain aware that many folks find this a time of great need. More importantly, we must always keep in mind that this need continues throughout the year. Just to emphasize this point, during this past year, our Chatham Food Pantry has provided over 15,000 pounds of food to our residents. The CFP is a vital ministry of St. Christopher's Church.

Chatham is a caring and giving community and we are certainly blessed to have a wonderful staff of volunteers who help lift a huge burden from our local clients. It is a fact that many clients are presently employed or have some limited source of income. Yet with minimum wages and only seasonal employment, they are simply unable to make ends meet. It is therefore necessary that people make trade-offs, where they must choose between buying food or paying for rent, utilities or medications.

The CFP provides a clean, welcoming atmosphere, where clients feel comfortable. Our volunteers make it a point to establish relationships with many clients. They ask about families and inquire as to whether there are other needs that may require attention.

One family with whom we've become acquainted is a family who is registered as two adults and one

child. After establishing a rapport with the gentleman, I discovered that his only "child" is a 40-year-old man with disabilities, who does not speak or walk. His wife is employed seasonally, so their income is unsteady. The dad is so appreciative of all that we do that he gave Ted a big hug after he helped carry his food to the car. He always asks for Ted, and when they meet, he smiles, hugs him, and gives a most-sincere "Thank You!"

Another individual who we've gotten to know fell, breaking bones and requiring surgery. She was unable to get out to collect her food and didn't know what to do. After hearing of her situation, we phoned to find out what she needed. The next day, one of our volunteers delivered supplies to her apartment. This continued until she was able to get up and about. This personal, meaningful service is what makes the CFP a meaningful part of our community.

It is with genuine appreciation that we thank our many volunteers, our St. Christopher's community, and all our supporters throughout Chatham. This ministry is a success because of you.

Stephen Ministry Graduation

On Oct. 25, Rector McGurk commissioned our first Stephen Ministry team. The team will become part of our ongoing pastoral care program headed by the Rector. Stephen Ministers participated in fifty hours of training, learning and practicing how to listen without judging and provide Christian



friendship and care to those facing a wide range of life challenges.

The Rector will confidentially assign Stephen Ministers one-on-one as needed to members of our parish that have requested support. Stephen Ministers will meet with their care receivers for an hour a week (or an

otherwise agreed-to schedule), walking with, listening to and praying with them. Their supportive care will supplement the Rector's pastoral work. All interactions between Stephen Ministers and care receivers are completely confidential.

Our graduating Stephen Ministers are Larry Jobson, Susan Newlin, Carolyn Otis, and Jo Vachon. Susan and Carolyn also trained as Stephen Leaders with the Stephen Ministries organization of St. Louis. The leader team has been responsible for organizing St. Christopher's ministry and for training. Our team has enjoyed a wonderful partnership with the First Congregational Church of

Chatham as we trained and built our ministries.

Stephen Ministry will multiply the amount of caring that St. Christopher's can provide. We have many needs for care in our congregation and our community: people experiencing life challenges such as loss of function due to disease or aging, family



stresses, grief, anxiety and many more. Our ongoing pastoral care committee has done a wonderful job of helping the Rector visit parishioners in need—mostly those that are home-bound. Stephen Ministers will provide additional support, confidentially visiting with people, and providing a larger pool of skilled caregivers with a calling to bring God's healing love and care to those who most need it.
